Financial Report

The financial accounts of the club are divided between the "General account" and the "Service account". All funds raised from the public are deposited in the "Service account", from which they are directed to service projects whereas most funds raised from club members are deposited in the "General account" and are used in the running of the Club.

Service Account

The amount brought forward from the 2020/2021 period was \$27 323.55. Up to 24th June, 2022, the Club generated an income of \$42 047.71 and had incurred costs of \$57191.58. The balance as at 30th June, 2022 was \$12,179.68

The amount brought forward from 20200/21 was \$1210.40 with a balance as at 30th June, 2022 of \$1461.34.

Member subs were set at \$270 per member for the second consecutive year.

A move from the Botanical Gardens, Succulent Restaurant to Salamanca Inn has proved, positive from both a member and Club cost perspective. Breakfast now costs each member \$21 compared to \$25 at Succulent Restaurant and the minimum number of meals for which the Club has to pay each week is 18 compared to 20 previously.

Meeting Venue and Meeting Charge

During the year the Club membership voted to change the meeting venue from Succulent Restaurant at the Botanical Gardens. The restaurant's management had imposed a minimum charge for its cooked breakfast whereby 20 members needed to attend. A number of times funds had to be found from the Club's general account to cover absent members.

The current arrangement with Salamanca Inn is working well with a flexible approach by the Inn's management to attendance and a lower charge for a cold buffet breakfast. Club members may pay either electronically or in cash. Members filling Steward 1's duties have generally mastered the Square system with occasional assistance from the Treasurer. Electronic payments attract a fee of 40cents per transaction. In a further step toward cashless transactions, members can also purchase tokens to pay for fines.

Zoom Meetings

The Zoom facility instigated during the COVID outbreak has proven an asset allowing flexibility in attendance both for board meetings and the Club's general meetings. Difficulties have been experienced with the sound system at Salamanca Inn during general meetings, but have recently been sorted out. Thanks to Pam Scott for her diligent attention to the tech.

Steward Roles

With shrinking club membership steward roles were rationalised, re-distributing Steward 3's responsibilities between the Chair and Steward 2. Revised duties are as follows:

Chair: meet, greet and introduce visitors to president; run the meeting; vote of thanks to speaker. Steward 2: Heads and Tails prize; set up and pack up; corporal duties.

Steward 1's duties remain the same: cash collector; record apologies.

The new arrangement has worked smoothly to date. However, on several occasions Heads and Tails prizes have been lacking; part of Steward 2's duties. This issue will need to be addressed in the new Rotary year.

Roster

The officer creating the roster requests notification of periods of absence before setting up the roster for steward duties and it has worked well this year. Club members have willingly substituted at short notice for those who cannot fulfil duties due to illness or unforeseen circumstances.

Guest Speaker Program and Sergeant's Role

Due to family commitments the coordinator for guest speakers was temporarily unable to continue in the role. Club members stepped in, arranging for several excellent guest speakers. Club members themselves also filled gaps in the guest speaker program, with member memoirs.

Gerry McGushin provided fun and folic in his ongoing role as Sergeant, with a steady stream of jokes, quizzes, fines, and anecdotes. This is an important part of making meetings enjoyable. Fines continue to be by default, 50cents rather than the \$1.00 suggested during the Rotary year. Club members are free to pay more if they wish.

Working with Vulnerable People Certification

The majority of club members now hold the requisite certification covering the Club's activities with minors and other vulnerable persons. Only two members currently have outstanding applications for this process. Certification is essential for insurance purposes, and no member without the requisite paperwork should attend events where the Club membership comes into contact with vulnerable persons.



Club Calendar, Documents, Archives, and Uniforms

The Club Calendar is an important planning tool so that Club activities can be regulated over the Rotary year. President Melissa took on the task this year and activities ran smoothly without problematic overlap. The Club continues to preserve documents and electronically archive them. Archives are important for Club anniversaries, or when previous members need to be contacted. Several new members joined the Club this year and were provided with the opportunity to purchase polo shirts and other monogrammed clothing items. They provide advertising for the Club at fundraising and other events where the Club is in the public eye. This year high-visibility vests were also made available to Club members for purchase, supplementing the monogrammed vests the Club already had in stock.

Fundraising

Catering

The Club successfully catered four City of Hobart floral shows with modest returns. An analysis of earnings per volunteer hour for different catering events indicated that floral show catering was the least profitable of all. A trend of decreasing returns was found, even before the COVID 19 shutdowns. This is due to an overall downturn in the popularity of the shows with the general public. Internal problems in the Hobart Horticultural Society have not helped organisation/promotion of the floral shows. The Board endorsed a recommendation to cease flower show catering from March 2022, in favour of developing other, more profitable fundraising activities. Notification letters were sent to the Events Coordinator City of Hobart with copies to the presidents of the Orchid Society and the Hobart Horticultural Society.

The Lea Scout Camp catering involved a large proportion of the Club membership preparing and serving food to resident school groups. Analysis has shown Lea catering is the Club's second most profitable catering activity, but figures may be inflated by Club members donating food. Some food is pre-prepared at home, while other items are prepared in The Lea's commercial kitchen. The November 2021 catering provided eight meals to fifty students over three days, while the March 2022 catering was reduced to a single lunch due to COVID-related restrictions.

Two Bunnings barbecues returned impressive profits for the Club; making the barbecues the Club's best catering earner in terms of volunteer hours. Problems in rostering during the October 2021 event led to a rationalisation of the team approach, the Club reverting to an opt-in roster which has worked well for other fundraising events. The Club secured a barbecue at short notice on ANZAC Day 2022 with all supplies provided gratis by Bunnings. The first hour of the barbecue involved providing free sausages to the public, nevertheless the event was a profitable fundraiser for the Club. Leftover sausages and bread were stored in Club members' freezers.

The freezer donated to the RC of Salamanca will be housed at Rosanne Burton Smith's residence from 22nd June 2022 onwards. Former Club member Gill Whitehouse has been its custodian for the past several years, but it is now more convenient and appropriate for the freezer to be located at a club member's residence. The RC of Salamanca will continue to extend to other Rotary clubs the service of storing food in the freezer; initiated by Gill.

The Club successfully catered District 9830's end-of-year event at TMAG, providing canapés for 80 attendees. Feedback regarding food and service was very positive and the Club made a modest profit of around \$500 for its efforts.



Bookfest

Two successful Bookfest events were held at the Sea Scout Hall Marieville Esplanade. This venue has proved more accessible for transfer of books than the former venue at the Arts Centre in South Hobart. Gerry McGushin has kindly stored book donations and most Club members have been involved in different capacities, before the event and during it. Both Bookfests have returned impressive profits with modest outlays for hall hire, advertising, and office materials.

Craft Sales

A craft group repurposing books has met regularly during the year at Cassie Van Grey's house supplying items for the Bookenz stall at Bookfest. Two stalls have so far raised over \$1200, with little or no outlay. The Club has successfully applied for a charity stall at Salamanca Market in late 2022 and the craft group is preparing suitable items with a Christmas theme

International

ShelterBox / Disaster Aid

ShelterBox teams work with disaster-hit families around the world, offering emergency shelter and other essential items to support them in rebuilding their lives.

The green ShelterBoxes contain family-sized tents specially designed to withstand the elements and provide people with temporary shelter until they are able to start the process of rebuilding a home. The kits and boxes also contain the items that help transform shelter into a home, like cooking sets, solar lights and activity sets for children.

Laos Project

In December our Club was approached by Dr Chris Williams, a neonatologist at the RHH, who is volunteering for 6 months at the Friends Hospital in Luang Prabang, Northern Lao. Nepal Project

We made contact with the Rotary Club of Kathmandu North East with a view to providing support to a Nepalese school. The Kholekharka Adharvut School in Shivapura Rural Municipality Ward No. 1, Bagmati Province, Nuwakot District, a remote region approximately 35km from Kathmandu, was identified as a school needing support.



The school has students from the age of 3 to 17 and the request was for jumper, shorts and trousers for each student. We supplied uniforms for 80 students.

There are continuing discussions about further ways to help the school and the area, such as water filtration, scholarships or helping women's cooperatives groups.

Interplast

Despite the continuation of COVID-19 into 21-22, Interplast has done some great work in training and providing on line support to many overseas medical staff and critical medical supplies to the Asia Pacific region. These staff have performed life changing procedures, which would not have been possible otherwise. To support this, District 9830 needed to raise funding, within the difficult economic conditions, in 21-22. The committee consisting of Debra Sealy, Karen Badcock, Cassie Van Gray and Val Manuelpillai put in the following actions in place, and were given substantial support by the RC of Salamanca.

- 1. An info stand at the district off-site in Nov 21, articles in the 9830 district news-letter and periodic messages on 9830 Rotary friends Face book page with a donation link
- 2. Planned for a major fund-raising function at the Royal Hobart Yacht club to be held in June 22. However due to the impact of COVID, this function has been postponed to Nov 22
- 3. Sent an e-mail to all Tassie clubs, requesting for possible donations direct to Interplast, before the close of this financial year.

My heartfelt and sincere thanks go to the tireless work of the D9830 committee members and the Rotary club of Salamanca. Also, we are very grateful to the clubs and individuals who have donated in 21-22. With Rotary's support, Interplast continues to help patients across the Asia Pacific. Interplast is in the process of sending volunteer medical staff to our neighbouring nations, starting from Aug 22. There are quite a number of patients on the waiting list for life saving surgeries and aftercare!

Arezo Hami is from Afghanistan. Born in Iran she has lived most of her life as a refugee. In Iran Afghan girl's were unable to study. Moving to Australia in 2015 Arezo started her school journey with no English, but with the help of her teachers is now studying for a Bachelor of Commerce and Business Degree at the University of Tasmania. Arezo spoke movingly about life as a refugee, overcoming the many barriers to gaining an education, and how the Elizabeth College Achievement Scholarship would assist in achieving her



goals. Arezo is active in the refugee community, often finding herself as spokesperson and advocate on a wide range of issues they face. Arezo would like to start a business, perhaps filling the gap in the provision of modest fashion for Tasmanian women in a way that satisfies their spiritual and stylistic requirements for reasons of faith, religion or personal preference.

Their presentations elicited a great deal of interest and questions, particularly in relation to Arezo's life journey as a refugee and educational achievements thus far achieved. The Rotary Club of Salamanca Achievement Scholarship is well worth continuing and I look forward to liaising with the respective college's in anticipation of the 2022 awards. Hopefully with lifting of COVID-19 restrictions we will be able to attend future award presentation events in person.

Men's Shed

This project has ceased to become a priority of the club since suitable buildings could not be identified and the Rotary Club of Hobart were successful in gaining a \$350,000 grant to build a shed at McRobie's Gully.

Service Veteran PTSD and Yoga research Project

RSL Tasmania asked for a funding proposal for this project in December 2021. A proposal was forwarded to the RSL board for discussion in January 2022. Recent correspondence indicates this proposal was not presented to the board or seen by the CEO. The program was costed at \$36,000, 1/3 of which has been collected. The future of this proposal and project will be considered over the next few months.

Colony 47

In this Rotary year, the Rotary Club of Salamanca approached Colony 47 to form a partnership, that could enable us, to directly help some of the disadvantaged youth in our community. The benefit for our club would be to see the impact first-hand, of our activities, directly helping some of the young people in Hobart, especially in the areas of, personal development, education, careers and relationships.

The examples of the support we discussed with Colony47 are as follows;

- Mentoring homework, career presentations etc
- Projects working together with the young people in projects that will help in their personal development, e.g., cooking, craft work etc
- Financial management preparing personal budgets etc.

To assist RC Salamanca to prepare for these activities, Colony47 provided the following support;

- A presentation on the objectives and operational activities of their organisation
- A good insight into the 'Advantage Thinking' process, that Colony uses, with their clients and staff and how it has helped in achieving their goals
- A presentation on the operational activities of their youth shelters.



The next step, is for the committee (consisting of Mellissa Harvey, Pam Scott and Val Manuelpillai) to meet the co-ordinator of their youth shelters and agree on a draft plan of action for 22-23. This will be submitted to our members to get their agreement. We are hoping for a successful year in 22-23, that will provide us some satisfaction, in helping some of our youth, to achieve their potential in life.

Spoken Language Identification Project

The Club's Board provided support to this Project which involves the upgrading, to an industry ready standard, of a piece of unique, Tasmanian University student designed and developed, software which has the capability of identifying in a matter of seconds, the language spoken by an individual. The software or 'app' resides on a mobile device such as an internet capable tablet. The project had its origins with the Glamorgan/Spring Bay SES unit, which identified a significant issue in communicating with crash victims who did not speak English and indeed were speaking a language which the SES responders could not identify.

The Rotary Club of Salamanca sponsored a RAWCS project 'Spoken Language Identification Project' with a view to providing the opportunity for other Rotary Clubs and other organisations to make tax deductible donations towards the development of this innovative 'app'. The Club donated \$1000 to the RAWCS project.
